William Morris Reduction Painting

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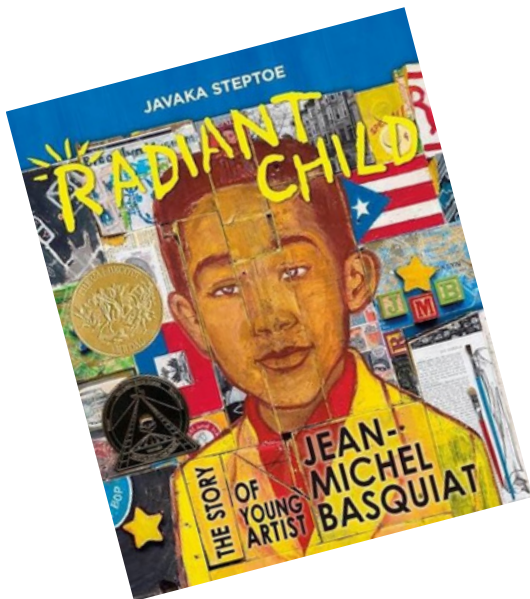

Year 6 Leavers Trip

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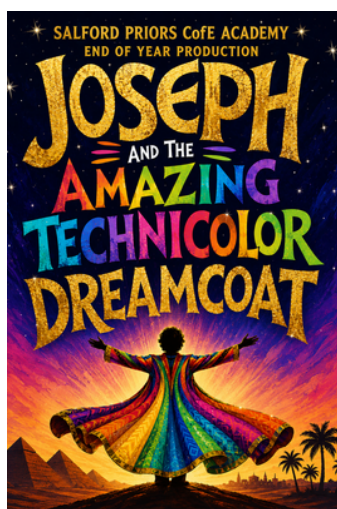

Primary Age Support (4-11 years)

Younger children need clear rules, close supervision, and repeated guidance to stay safe.



Road Safety

- Practise “Stop, Look, Listen, Think” every time you cross a road.
- Always hold hands near traffic or in busy areas.
- Teach children to use zebra or pelican crossings where possible.
- Ensure they wear seatbelts and appropriate car seats/boosters.



Seasonal Safety

- **Summer:** Apply sunscreen, encourage hats and hydration.
- **Winter:** Dress warmly and watch for slippery pavements or ice.
- Teach awareness of weather conditions (e.g. not playing near flooded areas).



Burns and Scalds

- Keep hot drinks and food out of reach.
- Turn pan handles away from the edge.
- Supervise in the kitchen and bathroom.
- Always check bath water temperature before use.



Choking Hazards

- Cut food into small, manageable pieces (e.g. grapes, sausages).
- Encourage children to sit while eating and chew properly.
- Keep small objects (coins, toy parts, batteries) out of reach.

Children with SEND may need extra support to stay safe as they can find it harder to recognise danger, communicate concerns, or process risk.

Simple Strategies to Support your Child

- **Teach safety clearly and often** – use simple, consistent language.
- **Use social stories** to explain situations like road safety, strangers, or what to do if worried.
- **Use visual timetables and reminders** to build safe routines (stopping at the door before going out).
- **Practise real-life situations** – e.g. crossing roads, asking a safe adult for help.
- **Use visual cues and symbols** (traffic lights, danger signs) to support understanding.
- **Support communication** – ensure children can say or show “help” or “stop” in their preferred communication method.

Safety at Home: Top Tips

- Use locks, gates, and safety equipment where needed.
- Keep routines consistent.
- Talk through safety during everyday moments (e.g., cooking, bath time, going out).
- Reinforce messages calmly and regularly.



Safety at School: Key Considerations

- Individual risk assessments for pupils with additional needs.
- Clear plans for: transitions, toileting, break/lunchtime supervision.
- Identified trusted adults.
- Visual supports used consistently across settings.

Remember:

Children learn best when safety is **visual, practical, repeated, and personalised.**

We would like to make you aware of a game that some children in school have been discussing and accessing, which is not appropriate for their age.

Poppy Playtime is rated PEGI 16 due to its intense horror themes, jump scares, and unsettling content. It is classified as a survival horror game and includes frightening scenes, as well as elements of violence.

Content of this nature can be particularly distressing for younger children. Exposure to scary or mature themes may lead to anxiety, sleep disturbances, nightmares, or new fears, as younger children can find it difficult to separate fantasy from reality.

We kindly ask for your support in monitoring your child's access to games and online content. Checking age ratings, reviewing game content, and having open conversations about online safety can help ensure children are engaging with age appropriate material.

Thank you for your continued support in helping to keep our children safe both in and out of school.



LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME

The law relating to Penalty Notices changed with effect from 19 August 2024. Therefore, Penalty Notices issued for Leave of Absence taken from September 2024 will be issued in accordance with the updated legislation.

- Penalty Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices – 4 in total).
 - First Leave of Absence offence: The Penalty Notice amount of £160 to be paid within 28 days, this is reduced to £80 each child if paid within 21 days.
 - Second Leave of Absence offence within a 3 year period (from the date of issue of the first penalty notice): The amount of £160 paid within 28 days. No reduced amount.
- Payment plans will not be offered and/or payments received outside of the 28 day period will not be accepted. Where a penalty notice expires unpaid the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider criminal prosecution.
- Third Leave of Absence offence within a 3 year period (from the date of issue of the first penalty notice): A penalty notices will be not be issued and the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal prosecution proceedings under S444 of Education Act 1996.

Action Counters Terrorism – Trust your Instincts



The safety and wellbeing of our children, families and staff is always our priority.

While incidents are very rare, it is helpful for everyone to know where to find trusted advice and information. The GOV.UK ACT (Action Counters Terrorism) initiative provides guidance on recognising and reporting concerns, as well as practical advice on staying safe.

Key resources include:

- **Report Suspicious Activity:** Share concerns about suspicious behaviour, materials, or online content confidentially.
- **Run Hide Tell:** Simple guidance on what to do if you ever find yourself in an emergency situation.
- **ACT Early:** A dedicated support and advice service if you are worried that a someone may be vulnerable to radicalisation
- **Free Training:** Short online learning modules for members of the public and education staff

UNDER 5S

Arts & Crafts Activity Resource Pack

Paper Plate Fans



Materials:

- Paper plate
- Acrylic or tempura paints
- Jumbo craft sticks (or dried lollipop sticks)
- Glue gun
- Scissors

Your child may need assistance with this activity, especially with scissors and glue!



How to:

1. Cut a paper plate in half.
2. Paint a spring or summer scene on your plate. Paint a rainbow, a cherry blossom, butterflies or any other design of your choosing.
3. When you have finished painting your fan, set it aside to dry.
4. While you wait for your plates to dry, grab two of the jumbo craft sticks. You can choose to paint them or leave them natural. If you paint them, make sure you let them dry completely.
5. Glue the craft sticks into a wide "V" shape to form the fan's handle.
6. Glue the handle to the bottom of your painted fan.
7. It is as easy as that. Make a bunch with different spring or summer designs. These are perfect for a warm day. Just grab one and enjoy the breeze.

Arts & Crafts Activity Resource Pack

Pom-Pom Decorations

Materials:

- Assorted wool (at least one pack for each colour)
- Scissors
- 2 Cardboard rings (multiple if you wish to vary in size but must always have 2)
- Extra Cardboard for mounting pom-pom creation



Cutting through cardboard can sometimes be tricky, so please ask an adult for help if you need it



How to:

1. Choose one of your wools and the size of cardboard rings you would like to use. Place the 2 cardboard rings together, using one end of the wool, begin to wrap around the circle from the middle out.
2. Continue this until you cannot fit the wool through the middle of the rings.
3. Using sharp scissors, find the outside of the rings and try to cut through the wool so that your scissors are cutting between the two rings.
4. Once this has been cut all around, you should be able to see your rings clearly, however do not remove them yet.
5. Take a long piece of wool and place between the rings so that they wrap around and meet. You will then need to tie them together, pulling as tight as possible.
6. When this is done you can now remove your cardboard rings by pulling them out sideways over the wool.
7. Once completed trim your pom-pom
8. Repeat this as many times as you wish to create your decoration



You may also find or own some pom-pom creators which you could also use with the method above, just don't use the cardboard



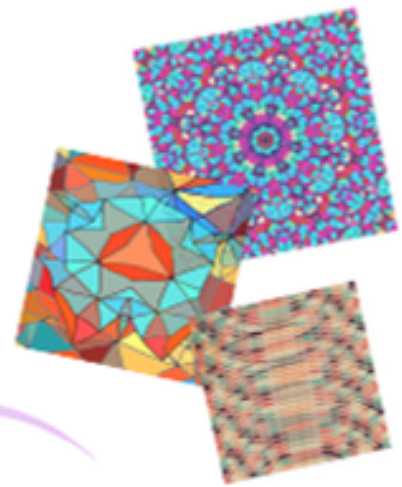

Arts & Crafts Activity Resource Pack

DIY Stained Paper Windows

Materials:

- Cardboard to cut create the frame
- a plastic sheet (a plastic wallet is a great alternative)
- Masking tape
- Cellotape
- Different coloured tissue paper
- PVA glue watered down



How to:

1. Place your plastic sheet down on your table - you may need to tape the edges to keep it in one place
2. You will then need to put a light amount of the PVA glue and water mixture on top of the plastic sheet
3. Help your child either cut or tear up the tissue paper in to different shapes and continue until happy with your design.
4. Once you have left sit for a while and your masterpiece is almost dried, paint over another layer of your pva glue and water mixture. this creates a laminated effect and makes it shiny.
5. Now time to create your frame. Using a a piece of cardboard created a frame to cover your masterpiece. Get creative!
6. Once this is all finished and stuck together, place your framed stained artwork on to a window and what the sun shine through



Why not try and be a bit adventurous with your frame by decorating for someone or in them with you stained window. Dont be afraid to add on any glitter or accessories
